

#### 2021—2022 Grove City Area United Way Year in Review Sonni Zambino, Board President

We're still dealing with Covid.....but

Life returned to some semblance of normalcy as we moved out of 2021 and into 2022. It can now be somewhat difficult to find a parking spot (one your vehicle fits into) on Broad St., local restaurants have made a comeback for their indoor dining, the unemployment rate has dipped significantly and most businesses are having trouble finding employees to service their customers. I would be remiss not to mention the tremendous help to so many families, all over the USA, who were helped by the Child Tax Credit. However, as the days of 2022 quickly pass we continue to have members of our Community who would agree that their lives are still anything but normal.

Today the cost of housing, food, transportation and needed medical or mental health services weighs heavily on the people of our Community who are barely making ends meet, whether employed or not. At least 15% of our Community lives at, or below, the Federal Poverty Level.

By LIVING UNITED our generous donors have allowed us to put money aside for those tough times through our Venture Grants. These grant applications are available to any of our agencies in need of additional money to fulfill their mission, and the mission of the GCAUW.

Our Community is blessed with having remarkable women at the helm of this organization: Amy Foley, our Executive Director and Kathy DiStasi, our Financial Administrator. Their commitment to Grove City is to be commended and celebrated. On behalf of the Donors and the Board I have to say "we couldn't do this without you!"

In addition to working with our Grantees, Amy and Kathy spearhead the following programs of the Grove City Area United Way: Food for Kids, Dolly Parton Imagination Library, Stuff the Bus and the Day of Caring. We are excited to announce that the Day of Caring will return on April 22, 2023.

Our Board of Directors consisted of 13 dedicated and wonderful people who represent a cross-section of Grove City residents who aren't afraid to voice their perspective. Each board meeting is a learning experience for me, especially when it comes to "Robert's Rules Of Order." I have been seated on many national boards and one local (to San Francisco) board. Being on the board of a charitable organization, in the town that raised me, has been a dream of mine for decades. From March, 2020 through September, 2021 GCAUW Board Members and Staff picked up and delivered the weekly Food for Kids bags at 8 a.m. from County Market. The bags were then distributed to GCHS, the Middle School and Hillview. Other board member activity included shifts to help the Salvation Army by ringing the bell at Christmas time.

We had three very dedicated board members "roll off" the board this year: Mike Clancey, Brad McGill, and Darian Murray. Their collective THIRTY years of service are much appreciated by the current board, and especially by the Grove City Community.

I also want to welcome four new board members: Paula Anderson, Thomas Biro, Nate Gressel, and Michele McCracken. Our Board and Staff look forward to working with you to serve our fellow residents, neighbors and friends in Grove City.

Two longtime friends and fellow board members, Mike Hazy and Alex DeGroff, orchestrated a chili cook off fundraiser at Big Rail Brewing this past spring. The weather was cool, and sometimes wet, but these guys raised over \$1,200 in one afternoon. Many board members were in attendance, and of course Amy and Kathy were there. A great deal of thanks to Alex and Mike, as well as to Bill Smith and Sean Corbett of Big Rail Brewing, for their hard work.

I also want to take time to acknowledge and thank some others who have been instrumental in the health and well being of Grove City this past year:

- Dave and Nicole Knopp, along with the County Market staff, who pack all of the Food for Kids bags each week and prepare them for delivery to our schools.
- Kathy Leonard and Abbie Turner-Michael who for the past ten years spearheaded the fundraising efforts for Food for Kids.
- George Junior Republic BARJ program for picking up and delivering the Food for Kids bags every week after COVID restrictions were lifted.
- Marcy Covert of Broad Street Yoga who once again donated all profits from the Beast Before the Feast to our United Way.
- John Jopek of the Grove City YMCA for organizing a Skate Night Fundraiser for our campaign.
- Rabbi Jeff Glickman and his wife Mindy, for including the GCAUW in their amazing Turn to the Wonderful project.
- All of the Directors and Staff of our grant funded agencies. It is because of the hard work you do each and every day that our most vulnerable citizens have a roof over their heads, heat in the winter, food to eat, after school care, community enrichment, and a safe place to live.



The Grove City Area United Way is proud to be a sponsor of Dolly Parton's Imagination Library (DPIL) in our community. The intention of this wonderful program is to instill the love of reading in every child in our school district and to increase early literacy skills to prepare our children for life-long learning. The DPIL sends an age appropriate book each month to children from birth until the age of five and has been shown to improve school readiness for children entering kindergarten. Dollywood Foundation founded Imagination Library in 1996. Grove City Area United Way brought the program to Grove City in May, 2009. Our United Way covers all costs of the program. All Good Things Thrift Shoppe provided significant financial support to the Imagination Library program in Grove City during the year. The Imagination Library is open to all children from birth to age 5 who reside in the Grove City Area School District. To date, **23,362** books have been sent to Grove City Area School District children.



Every child should have the tools they need to succeed at school. Stuff the Bus, a drive to obtain brand new backpacks and school supplies for Grove City Area School District students in need, began in Grove City in 2008. To date, **1,460** backpacks filled with new school supplies have been distributed.

In 2021, we were assisted in our mission by Broad St. Grille, D.A.M. Good Wings, Grove City Federal Credit Union, Grove City Area School District and Meals on Wheels.

## **HELP STARTS HERE**

Similar to 9-1-1, 2-1-1 is a nationally recognized, easy-to-remember phone number that quickly and effectively connects people in need with resources. Every hour of every day, someone in Southwestern Pennsylvania searches for services, from substance abuse treatment to care for a child or an aging parent. By simply dialing 2-1-1 (or 888-553-5778) our trained Resource Navigators can assess your needs and then match you to the best and closest resources in your community. The 2-1-1 database contains information on over 6,000 health and human service agencies. Together with the Mercer County Commissioners and the Mercer County United Way, the Grove City Area United Way funds 2-1-1 in Mercer County.



Forty-three percent of the students in the Grove City Area School District qualify for free or reduced-price school meals. While these students may receive two meals a day at school, many of them are going hungry at night or on the weekends. The Grove City Area United Way is proud to have partnered with the Grove City Area Chamber of Commerce Young Professionals and the Grove City Area School District to operate the Food for Kids Program. This program provides registered students with a bag of food, drinks and snacks every Friday during the school year. The bag of food is enough to sustain them through the weekend. County Market grocery store is a huge partner in this endeavor as well, packing all food bags for the students every week. During the 2021-2022 school year, Food for Kids averaged 61 students each week. Every Thursday morning during the school year, George Junior Republic students and staff pick up the bags of food from County Market and deliver them to the Grove City Area School District school buildings where the bags are distributed to students enrolled in the program.

## **Venture Grant Awards Return**

Due to the extremely generous support of our community, as well as informed requests made by our grant funded agencies, the Grove City Area United Way is able to once again offer grant possibilities to nonprofit agencies in our community, outside of our regular Community Investment Grants.

Venture Grants: These community problem solving grants will fund new or expanded initiatives in specific community problem areas, identified by the Grove City Area United Way as critical needs in the community and which are either not funded or not adequately funded through the regular Grove City Area United Way Allocation process.

Program Grants: These grants fund programs that would stimulate innovative and effective program development, management and/or service delivery to meet human service needs in the community.

Emergency Grants: These grants assist in funding unanticipated increases of basic needs which may include emergency food, clothing, shelter, heating and health care needs.

Agencies seeking any of the above grants must complete an applications process that will include a thorough review by our Board of Directors.
